FROM THE PRINCIPAL

MR PHILLIP WILSON

Every so often I think about the strangest things – do you? This morning I was looking at the College calendar for this week and I realised two of the events (being the 'Kindergarten to Year 2 shoelace tying lessons' and 'Year 10 into 11 Information Night') are a little bit related to each other. You may be sitting there thinking that I've become a little bit mixed up in this, but I'd like to explain why I think the two are related, and why many of the things we do here help children face the world with more confidence and wisdom.

I'm hoping that everyone who reads this newsletter is able to tie their shoes, and would know that following the process carefully and tying the laces tightly is important because it helps hold the shoes on and prevents someone tripping over. You'd know there are several ways of tying the laces, including 'round and round', 'loop and swoop', and something about a 'rabbit jumping in its burrow'. These little rhymes help children remember the steps and achieve success, and they show us all that there are a few different ways of achieving pretty much the same result (being that the shoes are tied). The Year 10 into 11 night is similar to me as we share with students and families about the steps they are about to follow in completing their compulsory schooling. They will learn about the subjects that are offered and work out a pattern of study that helps them with the next steps of their life. In the same way as there is no single 'correct' process for shoe lace tying I would argue there is no single 'correct' process for finishing school.

We are proud of the students who attempt their studies studiously and enter an academic life beyond school, but we are equally as proud of the students who work hard at practical subjects, or who attempt their best work despite struggling with their learning. Would you be able to pray for both our young children and our older ones? For it is important that our young ones learn how to learn just as it is important for our older ones to find their direction in life and be a blessing to others. Our young students might trip up if they don't know how to tie their shoes, and our teachers can help them fix the laces quite easily when asked. Pray for our older students that they might not 'trip up' as they think about their Year 11 and 12, and that they may also find assistance from our staff if they are not sure.


